The images reveal a familiar, yet unknown world - a dystopian universe that has not yet been touched by human hands.

Dóra Riederauer's woollen seats conjure up memories from before birth and from early childhood. The swings convey a feeling of safety, floating and caressing, thereby evoking a world of subconscious nostalgic dreams.

Wave - Acoustic and Light Panel

For *Wave*, a reinforced textile was applied to a corrugated surface, which shimmers metallically in a peculiar way when exposed to light. This creates the illusion of floating. The textile absorbs the sound waves, while the extended wave surface scatters them, creating unique acoustic effects.

The *Cross* seating collection works with a manipulation of scale and experiments with ergonomics. This approach lends these pieces character and results in unusual objects and situations that go beyond the context of the everyday. The experimental collection combines traditional craftsmanship with modern technology.

Peach Easy - Chair

metal, comfort foam, upholstery

The concept of the Relax chair is based on an innovative solution that reinterprets traditional upholstery techniques. The jewellery-like frames, produced using 3D metal printing, on the one hand give the objects a provocative appearance, while on the other hand, they have a structure-forming function. The comfort foam ensures an ergonomic shape and the individual parts do not need to be glued together: At the end of the object's life cycle, they can be separated and recycled.

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Blanka Timári

Ordina - Chair

Wood

The chair was inspired by a Hungarian folk tradition and is both a seat and a puzzle. According to the folk custom of the "Luca chair", a chair is made from 13 different types of wood. The stool made of 13 branches can only be assembled in one way due to its individual shape. The tension between the contrasts of tradition and modernity, between natural and processed forms, gives this piece of furniture the aura of precarious balance.

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Zsófi Zala

Nå – **Present Sanctuary**

wood, metal

Zsófi Zala wants to encourage viewers to consciously experience the present moment. Her work reflects the sensual experience and images of a very personal memory: the ice-cold lake surrounded by mountains and the sky in the late afternoon. The resulting artwork is a sanctuary into which we can immerse our face and thus sacrifice ourselves to the moment.

The name *Flair* is made up of the words "floating" and "chair". Eszter Hankó's aim is to combine her design process with the attitude of fine art and to evoke a nostalgic personal experience. The *Flair* chair captures a summer memory: the experience of floating on a floating rubber ring in Lake Balaton.

Wind Light

3D printing

All items in Dávid Salamon's lamp collection are customised. Instead of imitating mass production, he utilises the possibilities of 3D printing and is thus moving in the direction of digital craft. The shape of the lamp is based on modelling the forces of nature, albeit with the help of computer-aided simulation: it is seemingly shaped by the interaction between the wind, gravity and the molecules of the material.

Inner Spheres

AI animation

The dynamic construction of self-awareness builds up layer by layer over the decades. Each experience adds a brushstroke and moulds our personality from childhood naivety to the wisdom of later years. Each human journey is individual, but it is made up of the same building blocks: the foundations of human existence. The animation explores the structure of the ego using the metaphors of the Earth's spheres. Just as the world is made up of layers, the human ego is also created through the layers of experience. The inner journey that leads through the spheres of the psyche is no less fascinating and beautiful than the construction of the physical world around us.

Zsolt János Budai's sculptures are reminiscent of aeroplanes or watercraft, which is why the "bodies" of the sculptures are streamlined, while the "extremities" protruding from their hulls look like wings and fins. The colour of the objects is coordinated with the shades of sky and water. The small concrete building that serves as a support is modelled on an air traffic control tower.

The sculpture, built up floor by floor from paper porcelain sheets and elements, and then torn down, reflects the designer's mental processes. The objects, which represent prefabricated buildings are inspired by the emotions experienced during the creative process.
